Diaries, Memoirs and Correspondence

Volumes of letters, diaries, and travel accounts contain a wealth of material relating to country houses and families, as well as social, cultural and political life. Even when at their most anecdotal these accounts often supply valuable first-hand glimpses into a historical moment.
